Lesson 10 Words You Thought You Knew Advanced

You already know how to pronounce and use these familiar words. Now learn some of their less-familiar meanings.

angle VERB

to use tricks or sly methods to try to get something [Denzel is sure to *angle* for an invitation to Holly's party.]

balance NOUN

the part left over; remainder [I got some of my allowance, and I'll get the *balance* tomorrow.]

charge

VERB to give instructions to; to command [If the captain *charges* us to retreat, we'll do so.]

NOUN 1. someone or something that is put in someone's care [The babysitter kept a close eye on her *charges* at the playground.]

NOUN 2. care and protection [I won't leave my cats in the *charge* of anyone I don't trust.]

composed ADJECTIVE

calm and self-controlled; not confused or excited [Imelda seemed quite *composed* while she waited to give her speech.]

COW VERB

to frighten; to take away one's spirit or make timid [You can shake your fist at me all you like, but you're not going to *cow* me.]

distant ADJECTIVE

- **1.** related, but not closely [I met some *distant* cousins at the family reunion.]
- 2. not actually rude but not at all friendly; indicating cool feelings [Alex's *distant* nod made me wonder if he'd heard my criticism.]

gravity NOUN

the condition of being important, serious, or solemn [Josh's worried look made it clear that he realized the *gravity* of the circumstances.]

Out in a pasture:

MADGE: Isabel, everyone else in the herd is in a panic about mad cow disease! How can you stay so composed? **ISABEL:** Why should I get upset over some stupid cow disease? I'm a jet airplane! Zoom! Zoom! Zoom!

harbor VERB

- 1. to provide a place of protection for (someone); to hide (someone) in order to protect him or her [Any person who knowingly *harbors* a criminal can get into serious trouble.]
- 2. to hold in one's mind; to mentally hold on to [Daphne says she won't cheat anymore, but I harbor some suspicions of her.]

lumber VERB

to move along heavily, often in a clumsy, slow, or noisy fashion [The truck shifted gears as it began to *lumber* up the hill.]

mad ADJECTIVE

- 1. crazy; insane [Everyone thought the old man was *mad* when he claimed to be the king.]
- 2. wildly excited; unable to think clearly; frantic [The mother was *mad* with fear until her lost child was found.]
- 3. devoted to in an excitedly enthusiastic way [That couple is just *mad* about each other.]

reflect VERB

- **1.** to think carefully and seriously [I need to *reflect* on all the choices before I decide.]
- 2. to show, display, or demonstrate [Chester hoped his paper would *reflect* all the time and effort he had spent on it.]

SDruce ADIECTIVE

neat, clean, simple, and correct in appearance [Richard looked quite *spruce* in his uniform.]

stir noun

a state of excitement [The news that a Hollywood star would visit the school created a *stir*.]

untold ADJECTIVE

too many or to great to be counted, measured, or accurately described [That statue honors soldiers' *untold* sacrifices for the nation.]

wasted ADIECTIVE

weakened; feeble; worn away [Maria's battle with pneumonia had left her wasted.]


