attire uh • TIRE

VERB to dress; to clothe [I'm not sure how to attire myself for such a fancy party.]

NOUN clothes [A torn T-shirt is not suitable attire for that restaurant.]

chronic KRON•ik ADJECTIVE

- 1. lasting a long time or coming back again and again [I've suffered from a *chronic* cold.]
- 2. continual or done by habit [Kevin whines all the time; he's just a *chronic* complainer.]

distort dis TORT VERB

- 1. to change from a natural shape [A curved mirror *distorts* one's reflection.]
- 2. to change from what is true; to fail to truly represent [When you quote only part of what someone says, you may *distort* the meaning.]

docile DOSS•ul ADJECTIVE

gentle, obedient, and trainable; easy to deal with [Golden retrievers are active and energetic but *docile* dogs.]

doleful DOLE • ful ADJECTIVE

full of sorrow or sadness [With a *doleful* face, the boy watched his friend's family pack as they prepared to move across the country.]

fallacy FAL•uh•see NOUN

- **1.** a false or mistaken idea, belief, or opinion [Columbus knew that the belief that the earth was flat was a *fallacy*.]
- 2. an error in reasoning; incorrect reasoning [Diego tried to point out the *fallacy* in Jeff's argument, but Jeff couldn't see it.]

fruitful FRUIT • ful ADJECTIVE

producing results; successful [A bake sale may be a *fruitful* way to raise the money we need.]

immobile ih • MOH • bul ADJECTIVE

- 1. not movable [Setting the fence posts into concrete will keep them *immobile*.]
- 2. motionless; not moving [It's best to remain *immobile* while you're getting a haircut.]

indignation in • dig • NAY • shun NOUN deep anger about something that seems wrong, unjust, or mean [The accusation that he was lying filled Hector with indignation.]

ostracize OSS • truh • size VERB

to exclude or keep out; to refuse to have anything to do with [Larry knew that if he told on the other boys, they would *ostracize* him.]

pompous POM • puss ADJECTIVE

showing too great an opinion of one's own importance; having an exaggerated idea of one's own dignity [He's too *pompous* to allow anyone to call him by his first name.]

revoke ri•VOKE VERB

to take back or bring to an end something that has been given or permitted, such as a right, agreement, or privilege [Will the traffic court judge *revoke* Zeke's driver's license?]

snare SNAIR

NOUN a trap used to catch small animals or something that works as a trap by being tempting or attractive [Police detectives used the precious gems as a *snare* to help them capture the burglar.]

VERB to catch in a snare or trap [We must try to *snare* the fox that raids our chicken coop.]

splurge SPLURJ

VERB to spend freely or too freely; to be extravagant [Jim decided to *splurge* and get the jacket he liked even though he didn't need it.] NOUN wild spending; an unnecessary expense or luxury [Staying in such a fancy hotel was a *splurge*, but we enjoyed it.]

wince WINCE

VERB to shrink or draw back slightly from something in disgust, pain, or fear [Joey didn't cry, but he did wince when he got the shot.]

NOUN the act of wincing [At the recital, I could see the piano teacher's wince each time a pupil hit the wrong key.]


