Lesson 12

absurd ab • SURD ADJECTIVE

so clearly untrue, unreasonable, or against common sense as to be laughable; ridiculous [The idea may seem *absurd* today, but people once thought the Earth was flat.]

boycott BOY•kot

VERB to join together in refusing to buy, sell, or use a product or service [As long as that company uses child labor, we should *boycott* the shoes it sells.]

NOUN the act of boycotting [The leader of the group called for a boycott of lettuce.]

clamber KLAM•ur VERB

to climb awkwardly or with effort, especially by using both the hands and feet [We had to *clamber* up the slope with our sleds, but the ride down was great!]

up a tree and act like a nut.



divert duh. VURT VERB

Answer: Clamber

- 1. to turn (a person or thing) aside; to change the direction or course of [We made a ridge of dirt and rocks to *divert* the stream.]
- 2. to amuse or entertain [I tried to *divert* the children by telling them an exciting story.]

forlorn for • LORN ADJECTIVE

sad; miserable [Rain ruined the plans for a picnic and left the children forlorn.]

haven HAY-vun NOUN

any place of shelter or safety [When a storm blew in, an old barn became our *haven*.]

logic LOJ·ik NOUN

- 1. correct reasoning [Logic should convince you that eating less helps a person lose weight.]
- 2. a way of reasoning, whether correct or incorrect [Would you explain your *logic?*]

reconcile REK • un • sile VERB

- 1. to make friends again [We were always quick to argue but quick to reconcile, too.]
- 2. to make satisfied or content [I had to *reconcile* myself to sharing my room.]

skeptical SKEP • ti • kul ADJECTIVE

having or showing doubt; questioning; disbelieving [That boy lies so often that I can't help being *skeptical* about everything he says.]

superfluous soo • PUR • floo • us ADJECTIVE more than is needed or wanted; not needed; unnecessary [Keep your explanation short; leave out superfluous details.]

tempo TEM·po NOUN

- 1. the speed at which a piece of music is played [The song's *tempo* was fast.]
- 2. rate of activity; pace or speed [The guards marched back and forth at a steady *tempo*.]

toxic TOK•sik ADJECTIVE

poisonous [Many cleaning product are *toxic* and must be kept away from young children.]

vivid VIV-id ADJECTIVE

- 1. clear and lively; forming clear images in the mind [She included *vivid* details in her story.]
- 2. bright; intense (said of colors, light, and so on) [Max has beautiful, *vivid* blue eyes.]
- 3. strong and definite [I have *vivid* memories of the day we moved.]

waver WAY•vur VERB

- 1. to be or become unsteady; to tremble; to sway [When I'm nervous, my voice wavers.]
- 2. to hesitate; to find it hard to decide [Mom has started to *waver* about where we should go on our vacation.]

zoology zoh · ALL · uh · jee NOUN

the study of animals, their life, growth, and so on [For her class in *zoology*, Jo keeps a journal of what she sees on her visits to the zoo each week.]


