amble AM·bul VERB

to walk in a relaxed and unhurried way [I love to *amble* in the woods in the morning.]

bewilderment bi•WIL•dur•munt NOUN
a state of hopeless confusion [I got off the train at the wrong station and looked around in bewilderment.]

buoyant BOY•unt ADJECTIVE

- 1. having the ability to float or rise in air or a liquid [Lucy's life jacket made her *buoyant*.]
- 2. having a light and cheerful attitude or spirit [Terry's *buoyant* response to the problem made us all believe it could be solved.]

combustible *kum*•*BUSS*•*tuh*•*bul* ADJECTIVE able to catch fire and burn easily [Make sure that the candle flame isn't near anything *combustible*.]

commence kuh • MENCE VERB to begin; to start [The next game will not commence until four o'clock.]

debris duh • BREE NOUN rubbish, litter, or waste [A big wind blew the garbage cans over, scattering debris in the alley.]

to steal money that has been left in one's care or that one has been trusted with [The store owner discovered that one of her employees planned to *embezzle* the profits.]

fluent FLOO • unt ADJECTIVE flowing smoothly; able to speak or write easily and rapidly [Rick speaks fluent French.]

gaunt GAHNT ADJECTIVE very thin and bony in appearance, as from hunger or illness [As the grass died from lack of rain, the cattle became *gaunt*.]

hue HYOO NOUN
a color or a shade of a color [Maria gave the fabric a lovely hue by soaking it in tea.]

idle EYE • dul

ADJECTIVE 1. not active or working [There is a lot to do, so none of us can be *idle*.]

ADJECTIVE 2. lazy; unwilling to work [Our *idle* neighbor won't look for a job.]

VERB 1. to do no work [Tomorrow I plan just to idle away the hours.]

VERB 2. to run a motor while it is not in gear [If you let the car *idle* awhile, it will warm up.]

pedigree *PED•uh•gree* NOUN ancestors or a list of ancestors [Our puppy has sheep dogs in his *pedigree*.]

relinquish ri•LING•kwish VERB to give (something) up or let go [Your plan is hopeless, and you might as well relinquish it.]

- 2. in very poor condition or of very poor quality; terrible [My performance at bat was truly wretched.]
