align uh • LINE VERB

- 1. to arrange or adjust in a straight line; to arrange things to be in the proper relationship with each other [When parking a car, *align* the wheels with the curb.]
- 2. to join or cooperate with others for or against a cause [I'll align myself with the students who want a longer lunch period.]
- **conducive** kun•DOO•siv ADJECTIVE to lead or contribute (to an effect) [A gentle rocking motion is *conducive* to sleep.]
- **continuity** kon•tuh•NOO•uh•tee NOUN the state of being unchanged over time [An old mill on the river at the edge of downtown gave the town a feeling of *continuity*.]
- **daft** DAFT ADJECTIVE extremely foolish or silly; crazy [Ignore Mabel's latest idea; it is totally daft.]

epitome ee • PIT • uh • mee NOUN

a person or thing that has all the typical qualities of something [Her clothes are the *epitome* of good taste.]

facility fuh • SIL • uh • tee NOUN

- **1.** the ability to do something easily [Basil has a *facility* for making friends.]
- 2. equipment that makes some activity possible or easier; usually used in the plural [Our school has the *facilities* for science lab work.]
- **3.** a building, room, or area for some activity [The city council voted to approve construction of the proposed new health care *facility*.]

gallivant GAL•uh•vant VERB

to go here and there in search of amusement [My friends went out to *gallivant* around town, but I had to study.]

incredulous in • KREJ • uh • luss ADJECTIVE unwilling or unable to believe [Ravi gave me an incredulous stare when I told him the news.]

jargon JAR • gun NOUN

the special language used in a particular field of interest or activity [In baseball *jargon*, a "rope" is a long line drive.]

mollify MOL.uh.fy VERB

to make less angry [Verleen tried to *mollify* the director by promising she'd never be late for rehearsal again.]

- **momentum** *moh•MEN•tum* NOUN the force with which something moves [The wagon gained *momentum* as it moved down the steep hill.]
- repercussion ree pur KUSH un NOUN something that happens as an effect of or reaction to an event or action; often used in the plural [One of

the repercussions of building so much new housing in our suburb has been overcrowded schools.]

smolder SMOLE • dur VERB

- 1. to burn and smoke without flame [The logs were damp, and the fire would only *smolder*.]
- 2. to exist in a state of hidden or tightly controlled activity [Bert's desire for revenge continued to *smolder* while he waited for his chance to get even.]

stoic STOH•ik

NOUN someone who controls his or her emotions, accepts whatever happens, and remains calm in spite of pain or suffering [Everyone was amazed that Simone could be such a *stoic* during her illness.]

ADJECTIVE unemotional; calm and unbothered by suffering; self-controlled [It was bitterly cold, but Misha walked on in *stoic* silence.]

vile VILE ADJECTIVE

disgustingly bad [That movie is so *vile* that I can't believe anyone can sit through it.]
