behold bee•HOLD VERB
to hold in view; to look at
[Watch that actor if you want to *behold* a future star.]

colossal kuh•LOSS•ul ADJECTIVE
huge; astonishingly large [The Pentagon is a truly *colossal* building.]

destiny DESS•tuh•nee NOUN
something that is certain to happen; fate
[Willis believes it is his *destiny* to become a Major League superstar.]

judicious joo•DISH•us ADJECTIVE
having or using good judgment; wise and careful [The committee has produced a *judicious* plan.]

locale loh•KAL NOUN
a place; a specific environment [I received a post card from every *locale* Aunt Jillian visited on her trip.]

lull LUL
NOUN a short period of quiet or lessened activity; a calm [After a *lull* in May, business picked up in June.]
VERB to make or become calm; to soothe [Humming softly, the grandmother was able to *lull* the children to sleep.]

medley MED•lee NOUN
1. a mixture of things not usually found together [The stew was a *medley* of flavors.]
2. a piece of music made up of parts of other music selections [Joanna sang a *medley* of tunes from Broadway shows.]

obsolete OB•suh•leet ADJECTIVE
no longer in use or in fashion; out-of-date [In the age of computers, typewriters have become almost *obsolete*.]

onset ON•set NOUN
a beginning [Gary took the lead at the *onset* of the race but couldn't hold onto it.]

ramshackle RAM•shak•ul ADJECTIVE
loose and shaky; likely to fall to pieces [Only a daredevil would cross that *ramshackle* bridge.]

reside ri•ZIDE VERB
1. to dwell for a long time; to make one's home [Molly *resides* with her mother.]
2. to exist or be present [In a democracy, power *resides* in the people.]

taboo tuh•BOO
NOUN a custom, tradition, or rule that prohibits something, or the thing that is prohibited [In most societies, eating human beings is a *taboo*.]
ADJECTIVE prohibited or forbidden by social custom or tradition [Some behaviors that seem normal to us are *taboo* in other lands.]

tantalize TAN•ti•lize VERB
to tempt by keeping something desirable just out of reach or by making it unavailable or impossible to obtain; to tease [The birds outside our window *tantalize* my cat, who watches them hungrily from inside.]

utilize YOO•tuh•lize VERB
to make use of; to put to practical use [The manager tried to find ways to *utilize* each employee's skills and talents.]
